Established in 1995, GLSS offers custom semen cryopreservation for beef, dairy, cervidae and ovine species. They began as a mobile lab providing strictly on-farm collection and freezing services. Today they have grown to a permanent facility that can safely house and handle bulls of all sizes. Services have expanded to include breeding soundness evaluations, semen collection & processing as well as semen storage and shipments worldwide.

The Value of a Breeding Soundness Exam

 Dr. Kent Ames, DVM, Professor Emeritus College of Veterinary Medicine, Michigan State University

We will discuss the critical role the bull plays in your breeding program and the common causes of sire failure. Breeding soundness examinations will be discussed with emphasis on the techniques and interpretation of results. We will also discuss preparing your bull so he is ready for the breeding season.

4:30 PM-6:30 PM Field Day at McLaughlin Farm Ltd

McLaughlin Farm Ltd raises Highland cattle and is a local producer of pasture-raised, grass-fed and finished, dry-aged beef. John and Cathie McLaughlin sell beef directly to individual and commercial customers. The farm was originally a working dairy farm and was purchased by John's grandparents in 1932. The milking operation continued until the mid-1950s when it was discontinued and some of the facilities were demolished. In 1980, John and Cathie bought the farm and shortly thereafter reintroduced cattle, initially raising various breeds with their neighbor, Jackson Area Career Center. That relationship lasted about 12 years. Highlands were introduced in 2000 and are rotationally grazed and fed forages raised on the property in the winter. The farm is not certified organic but is trying to manage its property using the cattle and mechanical means of controlling invasive species. They use Gallagher Tumble Wheels for the grazing and a round bale unroller for winter feeding.

In addition, a few AHCA Beef Marketing enthusiasts will be present to informally talk with those interested in promotional approaches. Some vendors of grazing equipment and those used to feed forage, will be on hand.


Pasture Walk


